GEORGE M. BRETT PASSES

George M. Brett, well known resident of Windsor, died in Hotel Dieu Hospital on Saturday afternoon, following a brief illness. Deceased resided at 333 Pollock street, and was in his 73rd year.

Born in Amherstburg in 1867, son of the late John and Ann Brett, he started railroad work at the age of sixteen with the Michigan Central Railway Company and continued in railroad service from that time until his retirement twenty months ago. While agent at Welland he married Nellie G. Locke, and to this union was born one son, George R. Brett, barrister, of Leamington. Mr. Brett was well known in Essex, having been agent for the M. C. R. R. here for several years. He was a member of All Saints' Anglican Church and of Central Lodge I. O. O. F. In politics he was an ardent Conservative.

Besides his wife, Nellie, and son George, he is survived by a brother, William J. Brett, of Victoria avenue, Windsor, and a sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Drake, of Amherstburg. Deceased was a brother of the late R. R. Brett, of Essex, and an uncle of the late Enoch J. Gott, of Amherstburg. He is also predeceased by his sisters, Mrs. Minnie Brett and Mrs. Cecelia Gott, both of Amherstburg.

Funeral services were held from 11 to 12 P. M. at the residence of J. H. Sutton, 1240 Riverside drive, on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock with Rev. J. C. Jones, D. D., officiating and interment in the cemetery at the Elmwood Cemetery. Burial was in the presence of a large number of friends and relatives. The Rev. W. H.
