Amherstburg Echo May 26, 1905 Page 8 RICHARD ELLIOTT, caretaker of the Public building in this town, died Tresday morning, used 69 years, 9 months and I day. Mr. Elliott had been in poor health for the past year and a half, but his decline for a year back was very poticeable, and his demise was policeable, and his unimposed expected. He saffered from kidney and expected, took place heart trouble. The funeral took place yesterday (Thursday) afternoon from his residence to Rosa Hill cometery. Roy. Thos Nattress officiated, speaking briefly and the beautiful service of the Masonlo Order was given at the real-dence and by the grave. Mr. Elliott was born in Halifax, 15th August, 1835, in the barracks. his father being a British soldler, who afterwards was transferred to Amberstburg and less buried in the old Christchurch burlal ground. The subject of this memoir lived in Toronto. and Haldimand county, successively in his youth and was a school mate of the Hon. Richard Haroourt. He moved from the latter place to Iowa, where he lived for a few years before coming to Amherathury in 1801, living here over since. He early took an interest in military affairs and was color sargeout in the Essex Riffus, being called out in 1866. He received a veteran's medal and a dood for a grant of 160 acros in New Ontario. He was twice married his first wife being a Miss McGaire. Their union was childless. His second wife was Eliza Haines, daughter of Mrs. Wm. Haines, of this town and the mar-riage was solumnized in 1875. They had six children, one of whom died in infancy. The others are Mary. William, James, Eva and George. Until 1897, Mr. Elliott worked at his trade as shoemaker and carried on business in partnership with the late John Brett, In May 1807, he was, appointed caretaker of the public bailding by the Laurier government, and he proved himself an imperial and painstaking official and it will be difficult to replace him with one who has a higher sense of duty. He was true to his word, and true to his friends. He was assessor of the town for several years, and a public school trustee for a long term. His last election in 1904 was by sociamation and the Pablic schools closed the afternoon of the funeral out of respect for his memory. Mr. Elliott was the oldest member of Thistle Lodge No. B4 A. F. & A. M., in good standing, having been initiated in 1605. He was secretary for a number of years and was appointed tyler of the lodge in 1895, holding that office to the day of his death. He was also a member of Prince of Walor Chapter, No. 71, R A.M., and for 35 years a member of Lorno Lodge.

Elliost family compalsed three members,
—himself, Mrs. John Brott and Mrs. Richard Buddy, of Brantford, the latfor being now the only one living.
